AIR SERV RESPONDS TO DEVASTATING TSUNAMI DISASTER

Within days of hearing about the earthquake and subsequent tsunami in southeast Asia, Air Serv was setting up programs in Sri Lanka and Sumatra to facilitate the massive response of the humanitarian community. Air Serv provided flights for assessment teams, project managers and relief teams throughout the affected region.

With a grant from the U.S. Office of Foreign Disaster Assistance (OFDA), a King Air 300 and a Puma helicopter were sent to Colombo, Sri Lanka, to provide air transport for OFDA and other relief agency assessment teams and high value cargo in Sri Lanka, southeast India and the Maldives. Air Serv provided emergency assistance for four weeks before completing our emergency mission and focusing on the ongoing response in Sumatra.

Two heavy transport planes (IL-76) and three Bell 407 helicopters were sent to Banda Aceh on the





Indonesian island of Sumatra to airlift relief workers and supplies throughout the island area. The IL-76 flights were made possible by a donation from the Republic of South Africa's Disaster Management Center. A second lift AN-124 from Billings, Montana brought an additional two Huey helicopters in January.

"Most people assume that relief supplies are the only element of a response," said Air Serv President Stuart Willcuts, who spent two months onsite in Sri Lanka and Banda Aceh. "However, the people who plan, manage and evaluate these operations are equally important. Without them, there are no supplies sent out and none distributed."

Air Serv will continue operations in Indonesia until air transport is no longer a critical need.

CEO COCKPIT

Colleagues,

As I departed from Banda Aceh, once again, I came away with good feelings for the excellent work the Air Serv team is doing there as well as what we did in Sri Lanka. All of us can be proud of this challenging effort and very significant participation in this humanitarian response:

- A \$5 million program set up and working in two countries in a short period of time.
- The surge effort of the team in Warrenton to add to the already existing work load and the field offices who shared staff.
- The first significant resource development pledge program via the Web and our partnership with the Aircraft Operators and Pilots Association.

As of this writing we may finish our helicopter program by the end of April, but will continue a fixed-wing component for at least another six months or longer. This will probably consist of at least two C-208 Caravans and perhaps three. The Indonesia portion of the tsunami response is unique in that we have direct relationships with various NGOs rather than an umbrella grant from a major donor. —Continued on page 2

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Air Serv International Invited to White House to Attend State of Union Address

Don Cressman, vice president of international flight operations and a pilot for Air Serv International, was an invited guest of the White House at President Bush's State of the Union address. Cressman, who was among the honored guests seated in the gallery with the First Lady during the speech, was asked to attend in recognition of Air Serv's humanitarian relief work aiding tsunami victims.

Cressman returned to the U.S. on the morning of the speech, after having

spent over a month in Sumatra, where nonprofit relief agencies, to various he oversaw Air Serv flights carrying relief workers and supplies into and out of the tsunami-stricken areas. As a guest of the White House, Cressman also had an opportunity to meet President and Mrs. Bush at a reception following the speech.

While in Sumatra, Cressman directed Air Serv flights of seven light helicopters transporting an average of 14 tons of supplies and 20 passengers per day, most often medical teams from

sites along the coastal areas. Air Serv often brought in supplies by way of sling load—carrying supplies suspended underneath the Huey helicopter's belly—to inaccessible or severely damaged areas where victims needed assistance. In 1989 Cressman and his family joined Air Serv International, a job that has taken them to Mozambique, Sierra Leone, Liberia and Kenya, among other places, to bring humanitarian relief to those in need.

While South African government grant funding got the helicopters there, NGO funds and private donations, like AOPA support, are keeping them there. Air Serv has again demonstrated our ability to the NGOs and the international humanitarian community to provide appropriate aircraft in a timely manner and manage them for each NGO. As a result we are discussing how we can manage individual NGO flight operations in the future. I also give credit to our aircraft provider, Naturelink of South Africa, for this quick response.



On the matter of Air Serv leadership we will be making final offers to a new vice president of programs and vice president of flight operations by the end of May. We have candidates for each role with the final stages of the selection process being completed. The board of directors will be part of this final process.

In many of the after hours fellowship times with the various humanitarian staff who are working in Sumatra, each expressed their appreciation to me for the Air Serv response. Through this short note, I share the credit with those who made the response possible and who continue to keep it going.

Cressman Retires After 16 Years of Service


Don Cressman was honored at a reception March 22 at the Airlie Conference Center in Warrenton, Va. for 16 years of dedicated service to Air Serv International.
